

Guidelines for Poster Presenters

Purpose of these guidelines

These guidelines are designed to help you prepare a poster that meets the criteria for The Singapore Conference on Ageing and Health 2026.

Conference registration requirements

All poster presenters must register for the conference by 21 November 2025.

Poster preparation and display

- All posters must be in English and should be prepared in A0 size (84.1x118.9 cm) with a portrait (vertical) layout. Landscape (horizontal) layouts are strictly not permitted. [Optional] An official conference PowerPoint (PPT) template is available for download [here](#).
- Presenters are required to print and bring the physical poster on the day of their allocated poster session.
- Physical posters must be set up by 8:30 AM on the allocated day (Day 1 or Day 2) and removed before 5.30 PM on the same day. Any unclaimed posters left on the panels after the tear down timing will be removed. Please note that the Organising Committee will not be responsible for any damage or loss of posters.
- Please stand by your posters during your allocated 1-hour poster session. Conference attendees (including poster judges) may be visiting your poster and wish to engage with you. Posters without a presenting author available at the time of judging will be excluded from evaluation and will not be eligible for awards.
- Viewers should be able to read your poster content from a distance of one (1) metre. Make sure that your text is not too small to read.

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- Velcro tape (or equivalent) to secure the posters on the panels will be provided.

General Information

- All authors are responsible for the accuracy of their poster content.
- By submitting the work, all authors confirm that they have complied to all ethical guidelines and funding requirements which will allow them to showcase their work in this conference.
- Please avoid the use of acronyms, jargon, and abbreviations as reasonably possible.
- Please do not include complex tables in your posters: Summarise your key results rather than presenting large, dense tables.
